**Species Description:**

The California Poppy, also known as the golden poppy, is the state flower of California. They grow to about 12-18 inches tall and can spread out to 12-24 inches wide, producing a carpet of color when planted in groups.

**Seeding Instructions for an existing lawn**

**Selecting a Location:**

Choose a sunny spot in your garden that receives full sunlight for at least 6 hours a day. The soil should be well-draining; sandy or loamy soils are ideal.

**Preparing the Soil:**

Clear the area of weeds and debris.

Lightly till or mix in compost to improve soil structure if necessary; however, California Poppies prefer poor soils, so avoid over-fertilization.

**Sowing Seeds:**

Plant seeds in the spring (March to May) or in the fall (September to November) for the best results.

Scatter the seeds evenly across the soil surface and lightly press them in, but do not bury them deep; they need light to germinate. A good rule of thumb is to plant them 1/8 inch deep.

**Watering:**

Water the area gently after planting to help settle the seeds. Keep the soil moist until germination occurs (approximately 10 to 20 days). After they are established, California Poppies require little water.

**Care and Maintenance:**

Once established, California Poppies are low-maintenance. Deadhead spent flowers to encourage more blooms and prevent excessive self-seeding if desired. Weed regularly to reduce competition, especially in the early stages of growth.
